


Career Day 2014

The Class of '63 Still Rocks After 50 Years







The class of 1963 had a blast at their "blast-from-the-past" 50th reunion dinner dance held October 16 at the Marriott Hotel in Walnut Creek. Nearly 200 classmates danced to 60s music backed by projected images from the decade when they grew from high school freshmen to adults. The slide show, featuring rock groups and Dance Party clips, was created by "Beau Brummel" basist Ron Meagher. Former Commissioners-of-Assemblies Terry Lee and Ron Meagher MC-ed the program and passed out raffle prizes. Roni Johnson Jennings was given a special thank you for having organized the eight previous reunions. Former song girls and cheerleaders led the assembly in an impromptu Wildcat cheer (but did not form a human pyramid). Class mates circulated from table to table taking "selfies" with their old friends. It was an amazing evening of checking out the display of old photos from grammar schools and junior highs (organized by Anita Cacciaroni Cleveland), and peering from name badges with graduation portraits to faces that still showed signs of that 17 year old girl or guy you sat next to in physics or French class.

Classmates came from as far away as Hawaii and the East Coast. About seventy alumni and their guests met for a no-host cocktail party the night before the dinner dance and then again for breakfast at the hotel the morning after. It gave friends a leisurely way to really catch up. Stories of high-school escapades and reminiscences about classmates who could not be there filled the hotel's café.

Beginning with very little contact information and no email addresses, the reunion committee had a big job locating alumni. They divided the alphabet and used social media and every other shred of contact information they had to find the class of 1963. The 50th Reunion Committee was an energetic and dedicated group, led with drive and determination by "I will help, but cannot be the chair" Camille Chan. Richard Lee served as treasurer, and Denis Ko took care of printing the program and name badges. Ron Meagher and Mike Eash took care of sound and music. Wine maker and '63 alumnus Jay Pahlmeyer donated all the wine for the dinner from his winery. Many other members pitched in to decorate and man the registration tables.




Ronald W. Miller, Class of 1941 and Oakland High School Social Studies Teacher

Ronald Miller, who graduated from Oakland High in 1941, attended UC Berkeley and later returned to teach social studies and humanities classes, died November 6, 2013. He was 90 years old.

His students remember him for his class's model US Senate debates on hot issues of the day. He often assigned students the side in the debate they least favored, so that they had to do serious research, and more importantly thought, in preparing their arguments. Many also warmly remember his roles in the hilarious annual faculty skits where he usually played the villain, often in some ridiculous wig. In 1963 he joined music teacher Jewell Lord and English teacher Miles Myers in creating the Humanities class, which they team-taught, covering the relationship between history and the arts. The Humanities course was unique in the Oakland school system and a popular class with students. He also helped to create and lead the Oakland High School Faculty Senate, which gave teachers a voice in how the school should be run (also unique in the Oakland School District at that time), and was active in the American Federation of Teachers.

OHS TRIVIA Answer:


