"Working Hard For the Money!" OHS at the 2012 US OPEN

The late songstress and music diva, Donna Summers, provides the anthem to a week of bare knuckle laboring during the week of June 11th through June 17th. That week was the **US Open** golf tournament held at the Olympic Club lake course in San Francisco. OHS Football **Coach Jayce Goree** '94 and basketball **Coach Orlando Watkins** had committed Oakland High to participate in the staffing of a full menu food service tent on the 5th fairway for the three days of practice rounds and the four tournament days.

The coaches were intent on providing as many Oakland High volunteers as possible to work any or all of the 209 available 8 hour shifts that week at that food and beverage station because the food concessionaire, Prom Management, would donate to the football and basketball programs sixty dollars for each completed shift. I, as a retiree, on behalf of the Wildcats Alumni, personally committed to six days of volunteer work.

Virtually the entirety of my 53 hours of logged volunteer time was spent as the grill man or prepping for same. I should never have mentioned that I had spent a summer as a college junior at the now defunct Doggie Diner flipping hundreds of burgers daily. The last time I flipped a burger commercially was exactly 44 years ago.

Bev Shulster, Long-Distance Memories

Frank Kao Interviewer:

Although living in Israel since 1968, **Bev Shulster** has not forgotten Oakland High. She has provided her alma mater longstanding service by creating and maintaining an Oakland High School classmate and faculty on-line memorial site.



I asked her to tell us a little about her life growing up in Oakland and to share how, when and why she started the OHS memorial site.

Bev Shulster:

Here is the outline of my life story and my curious interest (some at my house would say obsession) with OHS, its history and alumni.

I was born and grew up in the Lakeshore district, on a small street off Sunnyhills. I attended Crocker Highlands, McChesney and OHS, graduating in **1965**. I went on to SF State, married an Israeli exchange student whom I met there, and in 1968 moved to Israel where I have lived ever since. We had two children, but unfortunately my husband was killed in the 1973 Yom Kippur War and I raised them alone, with the help of my parents and sister who had moved to Israel also. Both of my sons are now in their early 40s, one of them married with 3 children of his own. I am today happily remarried and living in the Tel Aviv area with combined families of 5 children and 9 grandchildren.

My involvement with the OHS Memorial Site had its beginnings back in 1985, at my 20th OHS reunion. For some reason that I cannot explain, I never expected to hear of classmates who were no long alive, even though my own life had been rocked by my husband's early death. And I was completely unprepared to find out that my dear friend Benji Yamane had been killed in Vietnam in 1968. I knew that very evening that I would do something to keep his memory, and that of the others, alive. I was working as a computer analyst/programmer and I knew that this endeavor would somehow be connected to the computer, but only when the Internet became widely available in the late 1990s did the idea for the Memorial Site begin to take shape.

Most of the other volunteers were in the front of the tent serving as cashiers, food handlers prepping and wrapping, stocking inventory and filling orders. Every time Tiger Woods, Rory McElroy or Phil Mickelson raced past the 5th fairway, the legions of thirsty, hungry and impatient golf fans would line up 12 or more deep behind our 5 cash registers. By the opening round on Thursday, the lines would appear before 11 AM with golf fans wearing the "feed me" and "water me" look. The queues would last until 4 PM and longer when the champions had late start times, as Tiger did one day with a 3:05 PM tee time.

Quarter-pound cheeseburgers, grilled chicken sandwiches, quarter-pound Nathan's beef dogs, ready made wraps and sandwiches flew past the counter along with Hagen Das ice cream, chips, cookies, fresh fruit, soft drinks, bottled water and beer from the tap. As fast as we could grill, assemble and wrap all the menu items, they were being sold and consumed. With hot grills from 9 AM to 4 PM, it was a challenge to deal with emptying propane tanks, halfcooked grill items dripping hot grease igniting the nearby tall grass, and the incessant demands from the front of the tent: More food!

No doubt that this griller was able to turn thousands of burgers and chicken breasts daily with able assistance from Jayce Goree, Allen Hoshida (Saturday), Cliff Goodwin '13 and Deshawn Beard '13. We all proved that we could stand the heat in the kitchen, fight small grease fires and eat smoke!

Coaches! Show us the money! Even more important than earning the money for both athletic programs, we all learned something about teamwork in a commercial enterprise. Better still, we learned it while working, not for ourselves, but for a greater purpose: our school and the teams.

Interim Principal Named for 2012-2013 Page 4



Alicia Romero, who has been principal at Oakland High School for the last 3 years, is retiring to spend more time with her family and beloved dog Lulu. She will move to the East Coast to be closer to her husband's home country, Quebec,

Before she was appointed principal in fall 2009, Ms. Romero worked as a consultant to teachers in the OHS bilingual department and as assistant in Oakland High's 2008-09 WASC

accreditation review, so she knew the school and some of its history and traditions. At that time she confided, "This is the only high school I want to be principal of. I love its diversity and spirit."

During her tenure, Ms Romero saw many physical changes to Oakland High: the remodeling of the main building and repainting of the original orange walls to blue and white; the gutting and renovation of the 1930s shop building (now the oldest building on campus); the building of a new building next to the shops; and perhaps the most dramatic, the transformation of the old auto shop into the Wellness Center, complete with examination rooms and tables and a doctor who services Oakland High students. Ms. Romero was delighted that several sophomore teachers ran a contest to name the three academic buildings after Oakland High alumni, and now the main building is "the Jack London"(writer); the new building, "the [Nellie] Wong" (poet); and the old shops, "the [Louise Thompson] Patterson" (social activist).

Ms. Romero also facilitated many academic changes from the creation of ninth grade families to the creation of two new academies: health and engineering. However, she was saddened by the necessity to cut into programs because of the increasing budget cuts. In her first year as principal, she was faced with having to cut several teaching positions, which resulted in the loss of the music program. She worked with English teacher and violinist Michael Jones to off-set that loss with an after school music club. The next two years, she again had to make budget cuts, and these difficulties helped her decide that it was time to leave Oakland after 12 years working in the district.

She takes with her fond memories of the students of Oakland High and looks forward to enjoying snow in the winter, red leaves in the fall, and tapping maple syrup from her trees whenever that happens. Always ready for a new adventure, she will learn how and when to do it.

Ms. Romero handles problems right up to the last day.

And then there are the alumni! A marvelous social history began taking shape as I read about them and their lives and my fascination has never stopped.

I get my information from consulting specialized websites that I have found over time, and have been aided by many, many classmates who inform me of OHS friends and relatives that have passed away, and others who send me obituaries that they read in the paper. Each year, as a 50th reunion is being planned for some class, there is an unfortunate flurry of activity -- so many new names get added at that point.



One of the things I love most about the site is the addition of yearbook photos for as many alumni as possible. The playing field is leveled and everyone is forever 18 and beautiful, just as we remember them! Without two dedicated collectors of Oaken Buckets, Bonnie Burk '65 and Bob Chan '71, this aspect would not exist. The number of hours they have spent scanning and emailing is incalculable and invaluable. They cannot be thanked enough.

And lastly, even though I plan to be updating the site indefinitely, I would love to find some younger classmates who might be interested in planning with me the perpetuation of this site and its expansion in ways as yet unexplored.


