

### Career Day 2015 continued

One speaker wanted to share the message that although he had sacrificed to prepare for his career, he now could enjoy owning a home and providing for his family while some of his old classmates were struggling. Veteran speaker Michele related that she was once stopped on the street by a former OHS student who exclaimed, "I know you; you spoke at my Career Day!" That's how she knows that coming to Career Day makes a difference.

So what did students hear this year? Students in 33 classes learned what is entailed in a range of careers from fireman to electrician to forensic expert to graphic designer to genetic engineer to airline dispatcher. They heard how speakers started their own businesses, what speakers like about their jobs—and what they hate, and many hours they must put in on various jobs. Many presenters who have moved from one career to another also stressed the need to be ready to "reinvent yourself" in the rapidly changing world of work and shared their personal stories of how they did it.

Students' questions showed their interest. Forensic technician Michele Silvia ('74) always gets asked how she deals with the stress of looking at dead bodies all the time. Students ask Frank Kao ('66) how much he makes and what kind of car he drives (teen-speak for "What kind of remuneration does one get in this line of work?") Engineer Norman Eng ('70) turned the tables and asked the Engineering class to solve some engineering problems, and teacher Mrs. Diane Johnson was delighted to see her students vying to come up with solutions.

Responses from the 22 teachers who opened their rooms to speakers were universally positive. Social Studies teacher Mr. White's praise was typical: "I thought both speakers were excellent! They touched on things that gave students a better understanding of the different paths through college and into a career." Leadership teacher Amy Dellefield, who coordinates the faculty involvement in Career Day, summed it up, "All the feedback I have gotten from teachers is FANTASTIC! Thank you so much for taking the time to coordinate this for your Wildcat cubs!"



#### **IN PASSING**

Demetrius "Jim" Rally, faculty March 10, 1930 - April 13, 2015



WAA is saddened by the death of Demetrius "Jim" Rally, longtime math teacher at Oakland High. Many alumni remember him as a force in their high school years. Our condolences go to his family.

Here are a few memories former students and faculty members have shared.

Steve Bornstein, former OHS math teacher: "I commuted with Jim for over 20 years. We hit it off immediately, and talked on the way and back from OHS. We laughed a lot together. He stood up for what he knew was right... He was a remarkable person."

Georganne Ferrier, OHS '63 and former English teacher: "Jim Rally was my math teacher when I attended Oakland High, and as I found when I returned as a teacher, one of the vertebrae that made up a very strong faculty. He has left a lasting impression as a man who was passionate about his subject and loyal, warm, and caring to those he knew."

Gene Zahas, '58: "I was saddened to see his [Rally's] obituary in this morning's Chronicle. He taught us analytic geometry and calculus when these were not part of the usual high school curriculum. He was stuck, as were we, in a portable across from the shop building. On warm spring days, he would simply say 'it's too hot in here, let's go outside' and he would teach the class on the grassy slope facing Park Boulevard. We had many great teachers at OHS back then, but if I had to pick one that influenced me more than any others, it would be Demetrius G. Rally."

## <u>District Funding for OAL Teams Dries Up</u> Guest editorial by Grey McIntosh, OHS teacher and Athletic Director

In recent decades, funding for OAL teams has been an ongoing issue. There has always been a disparity of parent contributions based on school location. In recent years, many of the city's wealthier families have pulled their students out of public education altogether, leaving Oakland's six public high schools attended largely by less well-off families. This has significantly decreased parental support for athletics in both funding and volunteerism. However, recent years have shown retracted funds from a far more alarming and crucial source: the Oakland district itself.

Oakland athletics receive funds from the office of the Oakland Athletic League [OAL]. In the past, the league provided schools with competitive coaching stipends, annual uniforms, full transportation, and an annual budget for each sport at each school.

Over the years this funding has slowly disappeared:

Currently teams are eligible for new uniforms only every other year; this is especially difficult for sports such as football, baseball, and swimming, where

there is heightened wear and tear on uniforms.

◆ Coaches' and athletic directors' stipends are pitifully low (\$1,247 annually per athletic director, \$2,346 annually for the head football coach, \$2,140 annually per baseball coach), directly impacting coach retention and motivation. With frequent turnover in coaching, it's hard for a program to gain momentum and create a regularly competitive team.

◆ It's also difficult to recruit players when often they have to provide their own gear, uniforms, and transportation to competitions.

While money isn't everything, it certainly impacts the success of athletic programs. In an ideal world, all student-athletes would be playing on a level playing field, equally supported in equipment and coaching. However, until that day comes, it is increasingly apparent that we cannot count on the OAL for sustainable funding, and despite ongoing efforts by our fabulously dedicated Wildcats Boosters, present parent involvement is not high enough to get us where we need to be. If Wildcat alumni could assist our athletics program in any way—donating funds to the athletic department as a whole, or even donating used gear—we would see a huge improvement in the success, morale, and pride of modern-day Wildcat Athletics.
