"Lion's Share" of Wildcat Alumni Funds Go to Support OHS Students

WAA wants you to know that your donations and membership funds go almost entirely to projects and scholarships for Oakland High School students. WAA board members serve as volunteers, and we have no paid staff. Our web site and newsletters are maintained by volunteer alumni. We pay for no office space, and our operating costs are minimal covering postage stamps, a P.O. box, and web space.

Be aware: The Oakland High School's Wildcats Alumni Association is the only alumni organization which is associated with Oakland High and whose money goes to Oakland High. There are commercial groups who sell "Oakland" or "Wildcat" items who pay nothing to Oakland High. Their names (e.g. "Oakland Alumni") suggest they have a connection to a school. They do not. To look official, they ask if you are signing on as an alumni or a faculty member. They are for-profit companies who legally offer generic merchandise that looks like it comes from a school. It does not. Whatever you pay them stays with them, and is not a fundraiser for OHS.

Mentorship by Frank Kao '66

"I have experienced first hand how some of our young OHS alums have struggled ...even after obtaining college degrees."

Hey Cats! Wonder what it is like to finish training/college (not just high school) and realize it is time to seek a REAL JOB? Done with training for a skill or having gotten a degree from a community college or university and now you are stumped about what to do?

Without planning to, I happened to have had a hand this year in directly assisting a number of recent OHS alums with newly minted college diplomas seek and find their true first career positions. Many of these college grads had been unsuccessfully trying to get interviews in their chosen fields for months before serendipity stepped in and they came in contact with OHS alumni who gave them tips on how to get an interview and land their first fulltime jobs.

Apparently the dilemma of how to seek and land a job is not so unusual for many OHS graduates who have gone on to achieve more academic success or learned skills after high school. If their advanced learning is not in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) or in business and accounting, the direction for employment is often unclear, if not confusing.

What complications might one encounter by having a liberal arts degree in the humanities or ethnic studies? The reality is that prospective employers are less likely to be calling these graduates for interviews.





These new career seekers are often boxed in by having one or all of these obstacles:

- 1. No college grad and/or no English speakers at home.
- 2. No one outside the family to advise and to mentor them.
- 3. No contacts or business relationships to network for referrals and assistance.

There exists an isolation that becomes a harsh reality for a young career/job seeker with all or some of the aforementioned disadvantages.

Wouldn't life be easier if that job/career seeker had someone who could show them how to prepare a résumé/curriculum vitae? Show them how to prospect for employment in industries or businesses of interest? Coach them on interview/conversational skills? Discuss negotiation strategies during job offers? Give them insights on how to seal the deal, so to speak, to bring an offer to conclusion.

As a longstanding Wildcats Alumni board member and having done some high school tutorial volunteer work, I have experienced first hand how some of our young alums have struggled with such issues even after obtaining college degrees. These issues give rise to a solitary struggle and impede progress for a hopeful job/career seeker.

It was a revelation to me that experienced and retired OHS alums like myself and a few others have made a difference. What if we formed a mentoring group solely to assist such young Wildcats in their first job placement. We OHS grads must number into the thousands in all walks of life and in every imaginable occupation. If WAA were to secure a mentorship core of a hundred OHS alums, wouldn't that mentoring unit be a positive force?

I have asked the WAA board to formulate ideas and vehicles to bring these thoughts to reality. Would you or could you as a Wildcat who has established a career be helpful in assisting a young Wildcat seeking a path to your chosen calling and into a more productive world? Huh? Huh? Huh?

And the WAA Scholarships and Awards Go To...

The Wildcat Alumni Association was pleased to be able to award three scholarships to graduating Oakland High School seniors at this year's Senior Awards Night held May 30th. The Alden McElrath Wildcats Alumni Scholarship for \$3000 was presented to Faith Ewere, who will be attending San Francisco State University with the goal of attaining a degree in Nursing. This year two Franklyn Delbert Helm (OHS'47) Memorial Scholarships were presented thanks to the generosity of the Oakland Methodist Foundation, administrator of the Helm funds. The recipients are Senayit Sium and Naudika Williams. Senayit will be attending the University of California at Davis to major in Political Science with a Business minor. Naudika will be in Atlanta, Georgia at Emory University pursuing a degree in Creative Writing. In addition to WAA scholarships, seventy-two other scholarships were announced and presented, including twelve from the Marcus Foster Educational Foundation. In addition, 130 OHS Seniors were noted as Oakland Promise Scholars. Scholarship Counselor Jim Wallace performed his duties as master of ceremonies in excellent fashion.

In addition to the academic scholarships, the WAA has a long tradition of honoring Oakland High School athletes. The WAA presented the Jimmy Dix Most Inspirational Player Awards for Baseball and Softball to Jason In and Alya Dunbar. Jason was elected by his Baseball teammates and Alya was selected for the Softball team. Each received a \$100 award and now have their names engraved on the perpetual plaque. Sarina Williams and Joseph Holden received the Stan Peters Award for Academic and Athletic Excellence.

General Anthony Jackson ('67), Sir!

In the late summer of 1965 right after Labor Day, my senior year at OHS was beginning, so I got to campus early to await the morning bell. In anticipation of how my classes would be and my overriding concern for the looming college application time, my freelancing mind was racing away as I parked myself on the Park Boulevard entrance overlooking the busy street.


Then the calm was shattered by a big, long yellow school bus from the then US Army Terminal that came to an abrupt halt across the street. From that massive transport alighted just three people, which emptied the bus: the attractive blonde was in my homeroom and the two African American male students I had seen around campus last year. The tall lanky fellow was Don Jackson, a senior footballer and basketballer and the shorter but more muscular fella behind him was his junior younger brother Tony, definitely a wrestler and footballer. The bell rang and my grand senior year had officially begun. UGH!

As the school year progressed and my student/class government activities increased, I would see and interact w/ both of the Jacksons (no relation to the later famous musical Jacksons). Not only were Don and Tony very athletic, but they were also very involved in student activities. However, the younger Jackson brother always seemed to make his point w/ a smile and even laughter among different groups. Ah! Leadership in action, I thought.

Well as life would have it, fast forward 45 years to 2011 to the joint class reunions of my '66 class w/ the classes of '67 and '68. I had heard that Tony and his wife were at the event and about his successful military career with the US Marines. I only had a brief opportunity to shake Tony's hand that evening among the 380 attendees. At the end of the evening, I gave our beloved foreign exchange student, Jemy Somsai, a ride to his sister's home where he was staying before returning home to Thailand. On that ride, Jemy, a loquacious fella originally from Laos w/ an ebullient personality, raved about how he was so elated to have seen and chatted up Tony again after all these years.

Okay! So what! But Jemy went on to tell me that Tony was the first black person he had befriended at OHS since coming from Asia and he valued their friendship still. Jemy was raving about their meeting and the events of that night as this exhausted driver dropped off his happy overseas OHS classmate.

This '66er having stayed in touch w/ numerous '67 class members, I soon learned of the retirement of Major General Anthony L. Jackson, USMC (Ret) after 36 years of service. Then I heard that Governor Jerry Brown had appointed Tony Director of the California State Parks and Recreation in 2012 to turn around some mismanagement problems there. Tony stayed in the appointment until June 2014.



This focus on an alum, Tony specifically, was long overdue. Believe it or not, I did not know how to begin a high school alumni newsletter article about someone I knew and do justice to all that he accomplished as a student, a scholarship college athlete, a distinguished military officer, a public servant, and a family man. I cannot begin to enumerate his activities in leadership, training and commands all over the world. I threw my hands up in despair when starting this soft exposé and decided to post his biography on the Wildcats Alumni website
